Stella Kammitsi was born in Cyprus in 1968 and after finishing her high school at St. Joesph French School in Nicosia she studied law in England where she obtained her Law Degree from the University of Leicester in 1991. She then continued her studies in the United States and obtained her LLM in International Banking Law from the Boston University in 1992. Upon her return to Cyprus she became a qualified lawyer and member of the Cyprus Bar Association.

Since 2006 she is heading the International Corporate Department of the law firm Chryssafinis and Polyviou LLC and her main area of expertise are international and Cyprus Corporate and Banking Law. She is liaising with a number of international law firms and is also organising international conferences in co-operation with associate law firms in various jurisdictions and also in co-operation with the Cyprus Chamber of Commerce.
